PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

REV. JOE SCHULTE

It is said that confession is good for the soul. I would agree with that because honest self-reflection is healthy. In that spirit, I realize I have a confession to make. It is one that is difficult for me because I like to consider myself on the cutting edge of theology, aware of the latest and greatest. This confession might seem to move me out of that category, but it must be done. Here it goes: I am religious.

I know it's not the thing to be these days. It is more avant-garde to be spiritual but not religious. There's even an acronym for those in this category: SBNR. Those of us who are religious don't get an acronym; we get called institutionalists, apologists for all evil deeds of the past done in the name of Christ, and unconcerned about God. <u>Tired of Apologizing for a Church I Don't Belong To</u> is a book by the Rev. Dr. Lillian Daniel, a United Church of Christ ordained minister, pastor, lecturer and writer. Dr. Daniel helped me to understand that I cannot, nor need not, apologize for every non-Christian thing done in the name of Christ.

More importantly, she assisted me in articulating the relationship between spirituality and religion. Yes, they go together; they are not mutually exclusive. They are actually two sides of the same coin. Give me a moment to explain. Those who are spiritual are seeking a connection or relationship to God. Those who are spiritual but not religious (SBNR) say they find God in the beauty of nature or in borrowing practices from a variety of places. But religious people are also interested in connecting to God. We see God in the beauty of the sunset, experience the presence of God in meditation, and are even open to the mystical presence of God that goes beyond our understanding. There are many paths on the way to God. I have chosen mine, but that doesn't mean I need to judge another's path.

I have found that being religious has enhanced, not detracted, from my spirituality. Dr. Daniel pointed out that the root word for "religious" is "community". For me, Jesus demonstrated the importance of community in his regular worship at the synagogues and Temple, and in surrounding himself with the gathering of disciples. In his book, <u>Effective Church Leadership</u>, noted church consultant Kennon Callahan stated that one of the great searches of life is for community. He believed that many people were looking for a sense of rootedness and belonging.

You can find God not only in nature, but also in the gathering of flawed human community. Yes, people in churches can argue over seemingly trivial matters. But I have seen people at opposite ends of the political spectrum become fast friends - people who, outside of church, might want to scratch each other's eyes out. One's political beliefs and social status are not considered when another is in need of prayer.

In community, I find myself rooted in a tradition that has been around through the ages. It has a past and a future, as well as a present. It is more than the "flavor of the month." I am part of something bigger than myself. The God shown to me by others does not always match the God of my own image, but this has allowed me to grow and deepen my faith.

There is my confession. I am religious ... and spiritual. Some will say that is not cutting edge. However, as I think about it, now that being spiritual but not religious is becoming the norm, maybe I *am* cutting edge and avant-garde again. Go figure. Either way, I will continue on my path of having my spirituality rooted in religious community.
