WORDS OF HOPE

I was inspired while learning how the first woman of African American and Native American decent, through countless adversities, followed her dream to be a pilot. Bessie Coleman, born in 1896 to a mixed, poor family of 14 living in the south, made the odds of fulfilling that dream appear bleak.

Motivated to succeed, she discovered a flight school in France where folks had a different view of women and race. So, against all odds, she learned French, applied, and was accepted to school. Bessie returned to the States, where racial and gender discrimination excluded her from becoming a commercial pilot. As a result, her only career option was to become a stunt flyer.

Bessie was determined to own a plane and open her own flight school. She would speak at churches, theaters, and schools to earn money. She would refuse venues that segregated against African Americans and became famous for publicly standing up for her beliefs.

Before her untimely flying death at 34, she had plans to start a school for disenfranchised folks wanting to fly. Bessie had become the sacrifice so others could follow their dreams. Gigi Coleman, Bessie's niece, is making her dream a legacy. She started a nonprofit aviation program for disadvantaged youth seeking career opportunities in aviation. Sharing the story of her inspiring aunt, she encourages others to follow their dreams.

Bessie, in her young courageous life, experienced prejudices and setbacks that would make most people run. The Bible describes all forms of racism, prejudice, and discrimination suggesting they are insults to Christ. Jesus came to share the good news that "ALL" are made in the image and likeness of God and ALL humankind are a part of Gods Kingdom. Consequently, while different ethnicities exist, there is by Gods design only one race, the "human" race.

DID YOU KNOW

That in 1853 a building planning committee engages John D. Towle, a Boston Architect to transform our 1834 "caterpillar" into a "butterfly"? The entire front of the building is removed; almost 6' is added to heighten the side walls thus raising the roof, and the walls are also lengthened which takes away the "box" look; then a single tower with belfry, clock and spire that reaches up almost 180' is added--all supported by a new 16' wide entry way. While this seems like enough work just by itself, the interior receives a total makeover as well. The leaky vestry rooms are totally redone as is the worship space that receives new curved pews with cushions, a new organ with a rosewood case, a new rosewood pulpit, four gas chandeliers & a new "orchestra" for the musicians. The beautiful rosewood pieces are still in use & the amazing chandeliers are now electrified. Thank you to our HSCC ancestors for their faithfulness, work & these wonderful gifts that have stood the test of time & made our neighbors happy as well!

RACHEL HUTCHINS

I have been a member of HSCC for over 15 years. I have served on the HSCC Stewardship Committee for over 10 years. Previously, I volunteered as one of the leaders for the HSCC youth group. I have enjoyed connecting with the members of this church and any opportunities to serve our community. As a parent, I appreciate the "forced" time of meditation and quiet I get during the church service. It is hard to slow down sometimes and I find an opportunity for this every week during the church service.

I enjoy running, reading, and horseback riding.

I have been married to Eric for almost 20 years. We have two children, Amelia (7) and Owen (1). We also have two horses, Billie (27) and Jessa (25) and two cats, Lucy (19) and Nutmeg (15).

We previously had two dogs, Jade and Cameo and two other kitties, BoSox and Hugo who we miss and speak of often! We've had a very full house (and backyard) for many years!

Here is Rachel's favorite Bible verse: (when you see her, ask her the story behind it) Isaiah 43 1-5a

What is the best advice you have ever received?

Stay curious about identifying the problem before creating solutions. It's better to get it right than to be right.

Do you have a real life hero? Who inspires or has inspired you & why?

I really have two. Fred Rogers is the first. As a child I heard him speak to kids in a way that validated feelings in a relatable way. I didn't always know what to do with it but sensed being able to understand emotions was important. His impact on children's education was profound and I understand his impact even more now that I'm older.

The second is Brené Brown. She is a social worker and researcher who studies emotions and has helped me understand and find new ways to help support my team at work.

Tell us about your occupation and why did you choose it?

My education is in social work. For the last 15 years, I have worked at a veterinary practice. I am a manager and focus a lot of time on building healthy leaders at our practice. The vet med field has a pretty high rate of mental health issues which have not historically been well supported. I wanted to be a vet, as a child, and found myself studying social work in college. A number of my dear friends are veterinarians and I have a long time fondness for the folks who choose this field. Involving my social work background has helped me find a unique opportunity to help build leaders in the vet med field with care for their social and emotional well-being. We also do a fair amount of work around the death and dying of pets. I am very proud of the ways our team treats this important part of life with pets.

Where do vou volunteer and why?

I mostly volunteer my time with HSCC. I have previously volunteered with the Bangor Humane Society.

What is one thing you would like to add to HSCC?

A connection with young adults at the college level.

Fun Fact about you:

I am a preacher's kid and have fond memories of living in a neat old parsonage (built in 1901). Up until a few years ago, it was only inhabited by the minister's family for my childhood church.
