WORDS OF HOPE

The Serenity of Silence

Silence is not the absence of chaos but the presence of control. Rage is chaotic, so too is lust; neither of which need sound to be present. To quiet the storms in our hearts, we need only bring order to the confusion. One can only stay silent by showing restraint. A teacher should instruct by considering what they say. Every manner of thought passes through the mind, every kind of emotion is felt in the heart, but if each thought were said and every emotion expressed, then even in sleep there would be no rest. Silence bridals the tongue and reins in the heart. It does not always stop the fire within, but it keeps the fire from spreading.

Consider silence when you do not know what to say. It is better to say nothing than it is to say the wrong thing. How good it is to sleep in peace. How can there be a fire with nothing to burn or how can there be an argument without words? Quiet places are quite peaceful. There is music all around us, and we can only hear it if we are listening.

WEEKLY FLOWER DEDICATIONS

This is just a reminder that the flowers are a beautiful addition to our weekly Sunday services and now is the time of the year to start signing up ahead of time for any dedications that you would like to donate the flowers for to save your date before it's gone. DID YOU KNOW

that our worship space has undergone some major changes? The first is in 1853 when the entire structure is rebuilt in its current form and the four large gas gilt chandeliers & rosewood pulpit with carved grapevines are added. The first color we know about comes in 1883 with the installation of the Rev. Maltby memorial stained-glass window & next in 1885 with the Woodhull windows. Then in 1891 there's a dramatic change in decor at the hands of painters from the Tiffany Glass Co. who paint a dark orange halfway up the walls & use a lighter shade for the upper half -- finishing with a beautiful frescoing. There is a clouded effect on the ceiling with a dark red border. After 20 years the motif becomes Romanesque with walls tinted a soft brown & ceiling an olive gray & the Lord's Prayer & Apostles Creed on the front walls (from Tiffany work?) are replaced with verses from John 15 on Jesus as the true vine & encircled by lilies & grape vines. A note on redecoration in 1975 reports the walls "...a lovely shade of gold." In 1963 & 1983 there are major renovations & painting but neither apparently very "dramatic." The new colors we currently experience came in our stainedglass additions in 1901, 1913-1914, 1955 & finally in 1960.



Meet our Third ADELLA Project participants, and an HSCC love story! Larry and Elaine Blethen

Larry and Elaine Blethen met at HSCC in 1953. They have been involved in the church through the choir, the trustees, the 'willing workers', and the music committee. As the saying goes, "behind every great man is a great woman", and if Larry is the wheel then Elaine is the grease, keeping the wheels turning!

Larry's favorite Bible verse is Philippians 4:13- "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me", and Elaine's favorite is Luke 10:25 - 37 the parable of the Good Samaritan.

Larry and Elaine both like to read, watch comedy shows, and in the past, they were passionate about sailing. They enjoyed their 19 foot day-sailer very much, which enabled them to experience the power of the wind and the beauty of the earth from the water.

Their family consists of 3 children, 9 grandchildren, 5 great grandchildren, and a cat named Willow.

The Blethens live by the Golden Rule: Do unto others as you would have them do unto you, and Elaine also likes "Either fish or cut bait". The best advice they have received is 'make sure you know where you are going before you leave', and 'you'll get over it'.

When we asked the Blethens "if you could change one thing about HSCC, what would it be?," they both said that they would like more information about Sunday School, broadcasted to the public.

Larry joined the navy four days after they were married. After active duty, he was in the reserve for a total of 30 years. While on reserve duty, he also worked full time for the telephone company until his retirement in 1991, 36 years later. Elaine was a registered dietitian, at Tufts University School of Medicine in Boston doing nutritional research on diet and disease. She retired in 1992, and they moved back to Maine in 1997.

And now for the great love story: In 1953, HSCC pastor, Reverend Ernst asked Larry to come and speak to a meeting of the Young Adult group at HSCC to show the group some pictures of the damage to a ship he was on that went through a typhoon on the Pacific Ocean. After the meeting, Reverend Ernst told Larry he had to get his car out of the public garage to take one of the girls home to Brewer, as he was concerned about her walking across the bridge. Larry said he would be pleased to take her home. The girl he took home was Elaine Carroll, a University of Maine student, and as Larry revealed to us, "pleasant to talk to". That meeting was in April, and they were married in October of 1953. After almost 70 years, they are still happily married!

Finally, some fun facts about the Blethens. They enjoy playing Monopoly and watching Jeopardy, and Elaine enjoys reading *Jan Karon's Mitford series*. Larry remembers his favorite 3rd grade teacher, Mrs. Carrie Rowe, because she was "born to teach" meaning that she had natural talent and she would make sure that her students understood what she was teaching.
