1 Peter 2.21

For to this you have been called because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps.

WORDS OF HOPE

I'm sure everyone remembers the WWJD? Era with all its bookmarks and buttons, but I think about this question often. I mean seriously often. When we ask each other what we do, it usually is regarding what do we do for a living. If Jesus had a business card, what would he do? What would the card say?

In scripture, we read about Jesus saying and doing many things. His mother asked him at a wedding party to turn some water into wine. Another time he walked on water. We read that he was a healer, a performer of miracles, the great liberator. You might know that back in the day, if you repeated something he said in public, or told someone that you thought he was telling the truth and you were therefore going to follow him, you could very be likely killed. Would that have been a small-print warning on his business card?

I see all kinds of services on a business card that he offers. "Son of the one true God" "Instant Winemaker for Parties" subtitled "Do not ask me how I do it!" And others like "Wilderness Seeker," "Christ Family Carpenter" - Subtitled: "the perfect table for any occasion, especially Communion!" "Crowd-gathering Speech Writer: Stuff too good to repeat!" "Jesus the Divine: Millions Served."

What about Jesus' pronoun? There's not really a way to inclusify that kind of male God. Jesus was a "he" but in God's divine Trinitarian nature of having created us in their image, Jesus may have been the very first "they/them."

You get the idea. I also think that I probably obsess too much over labeling and titles, but to be inclusive you must look at these things. It's hard to describe the nature of someone who was historically real but was credited with so many things that are so far out of our understanding, we must either accept it in faith, or perhaps, question Him and his ultimate purpose.

The ultimate question, however, is this: If you are a follower of Jesus what would you do? What should you do? How would you describe your purpose in calling Jesus your example for living? What would your business card say?

DID YOU KNOW

That in June, 1832 when a man from Massachusetts agreed to a salary cut to accepted a job offer in Bangor, arrived and saw the town & workplace said "As I was here with my family and household goods, I concluded I would not turn about and go back." This decision made by Rev. Enoch Pond, D.D. (1791-1882) that day was the start of a 50-year tenure at a then struggling Bangor Theological Seminary that he helped turn around & develop into a reputable, respected institution, serving faithfully until his death. That decision also led to another significant relationship with the yet to be constituted Hammond Street Congregational Church. After we formally became a congregation in December 1833, Rev. Pond served the congregation's many needs & conducted worship services for 8 months while we searched for our first pastor. Interestingly, our records show there was only one candidate, a Rev. John Maltby (1795-1860), who just happened to be Rev. Pond's brother-in-law, because he had married John's sister, Julia Ann Pond (1797-1838). Rev. Maltby, installed July 23, 1834, served for 26 years. During those two plus decades, Rev. Pond & his family were active members of HSCC and, after Rev. Maltby's death, Rev. Pond once again tended to the needs of the now grieving congregation that he knew so well. So, from our very beginning we have had a close relationship with the now former Seminary. Reports show Rev. Pond was held in high esteem not only by his colleagues but by years of BTS graduates as evidenced by the obelisk-style monument at his grave site in Mt Hope Cemetery. The inscription reads in part: "For half a century Professor in Bangor Theological Seminary. Erected in his memory by the Alumni of the Seminary." Likewise, we have The Maltby Memorial Window. All this goodness & blessing because of one man's "right decision" in 1832. Thanks be to God!
