FROM THE PASTOR'S OFFICE

SCRIPTURE

Esther 7:2

And on the second day of the feast, as they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, "What is your wish, Queen Esther? It shall be granted you. And what is your request? Even to the half of my kingdom, it shall be fulfilled."

WORDS OF HOPE

The Book of Esther is the story of a woman who had risen from slaving as a Hebrew servant to being the Queen of all of Persia alongside the empire's King Ahasuerus. His name literally means The Lion King, and he held the absolute power that the name implies. His offer to Esther was half of all the material wealth in their world.

Artifacts from the Kingdom of Persia in those days give us a good idea that the wealth and splendor of that empire was considerable, and the king the Bible calls Ahasuerus was probably Xerxes I, one of the greatest rulers of his era. Esther's answer could have rewarded her with power and possessions we read about only in fairy tales, but Esther was not obsessed with a personal happy ending. She wanted nothing but a guarantee of a safe and respected life for her family, the Hebrew people. Their quality of existence meant more to her than any extravagant personal luxury.

Today we consider Esther one of Scripture's most enduring heroic figures, but I wonder how we would regard her in our own game show-mentality culture? I've had the privilege of watching the evolution of that media genre from shows like Queen for a Day in which the Holy Grail of prizes was a washer/dryer to morphing into trips around the world and million-dollar contracts for endorsing some product that sponsors the show.

Reality shows cast their contestants according to the degrees of greed and ruthlessness they display in auditions. The Real Housewives series producers look for entire families driven by those same behavior traits, or who, at least, can give the audience that impression. And we cheer for them. Are there any Esthers left in our world?

Thanks be to God, there are. Many of them come to mind. My own nomination for the Esther of the Year award would be Dolly Parton. Even though she's best-known for her singing and songwriting triumphs, she is a philanthropist and humanitarian who would make Esther proud. She's championed causes including childhood literacy, environmental conservation, veterans with PTSD, established the Dollywood scholarship foundation, donated \$1 million to help develop the COVID-19 vaccine, and even convinced a billionaire to give \$100 million to a fund that will continue the good works of her charitable foundations far into the future.

The ancient scriptures use far too many pages glorifying the military victories of its pompous kings, just as our culture burns up too much social media electricity being obsessed with the activities of the greedy rich and famous. But the stories that hold the true hopes that advance both of our civilizations will always star people like Esther and Dolly.

CHURCH CLERK NEEDED

Hammond Street Church is looking for a Clerk. This is a three-year position, elected by the congregation at the Annual Meeting. The duties and responsibilities are laid down in the by-laws as follows.

The Clerk shall keep a record and oversee the distribution of minutes of all business meetings of the church, of the Church Council, and of the Executive

church, of the Church Council, and of the Executive Committee; keep on file all official reports, give legal notice of all corporation meetings, notify all officers, members of committees and delegates of their election; and keep an accurate register, with name, date, and classification of all member admissions, dismissions, deaths, and baptisms. The Clerk shall be legally sworn.

DID YOU KNOW

That at the funeral service for our first pastor, Rev. John Maltby, Jr., May 18, 1860, Rev. Dr. George Shepherd delivered the sermon, just as he had done for Rev. Maltby's Installation Service on July 23, 1834 -- an undoubtedly rare "bookending "of a Pastor's life of service in a congregation. Rev. Shepherd shared with the mourners the last barely whispered words of their Pastor -- "submission," as in submitting all to God & then "all is well." Rev. Enoch Pond later wrote that his brother-in-law "...exhibited some traits of character which are not often seen in the same individual. He was ardent, and yet prudent; radical, in the good sense of the term, and yet conservative; decided in his own opinions and views, and yet liberal and charitable in his judgment of others." His life began March 8, 1795 on a farm in Northford, CT. John Sr. wanted John Jr. to farm as well, so purchased a nearby farm for him; however, at 18 he experienced a conversion & preparation for a much different occupation took him to Yale & next to the Seminary in Andover, MA, graduating in 1825. He accepted a call to Sutton, MA where he was ordained in 1826. His last call would be to Hammond Street Church where 624 people joined during his 26-year pastorate. He was gifted as a preacher & answered calls to fill pulpits for poorer churches in Maine that had no ministers. In addition to preaching, he was actively involved in our Sunday School & weekly prayer meetings. He was "shepherd" for the HSC flock, caring for & meeting its needs, thus cementing his relationship with the people. His focus & involvement extended beyond our walls & included supporting mission work worldwide, serving the Penobscot Conference in various capacities & Bangor Theological Seminary where he was on the of Board of Trustees 1835-1860, serving as President 1849-1860.
