WORDS OF HOPE

In the past years' picnics and birthday parties, we always enjoyed a lot of outdoor activities, events that some still practice and others that have been lost to history. Have you ever been in a potato sack race?

At the childhood parties I remember the most, there often was a "potato sack and usually exhausting race" in which children (and occasionally some adults) played this lively and usually exhausting game. Racing from the start point to the finish, each team of two individuals skip and hop along. Each individual keeps one of their legs securely inside the same cotton bag. The teams hop and skip in all directions, on course to finish outside the boundaries of the course.

If a team falls, it takes the cooperation of both players to get back on their feet and continue the race. Each player must trust the other one to try to stay in a coordinated movement of hop, hop, hop. They must hang onto each other for dear life and keep constant communication. But, most importantly, only one of the two players must be the leader and set the pace for the path! The other player must faithfully hop at that leader's pace.

In these times of uncertainty, do you feel that you are in a potato sack race? Do you trust that you can find the path and win the race by yourself? If that is your plan, you'll have both feet in the sack and get all tangled up (good luck)!

On the other hand, do you choose to let God set the pace, set the path, and speak encouragement along the race? I know this is an anthropomorphic view of God and life is not exactly a sack race, but you can truly hang onto God for dear life, by spending time in quiet prayer and listening to advice from God.

How is your race currently going? It may be a good time to reflect on how you want to run the race of daily life. Will you let God lead in your race or will you go it alone?

DID YOU KNOW

That the Newbery Medal recipient for 1923 was Charles Boardman Hawes (Jan 24, 1889-Jul 19, 1923.) He was the 3rd such winner, but first American so honored. The Medal, given "for the most distinguished contribution to American literature for children" was for his third book, The Dark Frigate published in 1923. It was accepted posthumously in 1924 by his wife, Dorothea (Cable) Hawes. Born in Clifton Springs, NY, his parents moved to Bangor shortly thereafter. He attended Bangor schools then Bowdoin College, class of 1911, followed by graduate work at Harvard. Sometime in his youth he developed a love for both writing & the sea. His first published & celebrated writings were short stories that started after leaving Bowdoin where he was Editor of the "Quill;" he continued writing at Harvard on the staff of "The Youth's Companion" & finally, for "The Open Road" magazine as its Editor until his death. After his first two adventure books came out (The Mutineers & The Great Quest) Charles had the literary world's close attention, culminating in The Newbery Metal; unfortunately, he did not live long enough to see the book published & so honored. Before contracting a fatal case of pneumonia meningitis in July 1923, he had also finished a 4th book, Gloucester By Land and Sea, & started a 5th book entitled Whaling, subsequently released under his & his wife's names. A memorial tablet hanging in the Bowdoin library reads in part: "...Writer of distinction & promise...'On the threshold of a remarkable career'" Charles joined HSCC at the age of 15, March 6, 1904; his parents, Rev. Charles Taylor & Martha Tibbetts (Boardman) Hawes joined in 1892 & 1876 respectively & his maternal grandparents, Benjamin Hill Boardman & Flavilla (Tibbetts) Boardman joined in 1876. The 1910 Census shows the Hawes family living at 41 James Street in Bangor -interestingly, home of another creative HSCC couple, Rev. Greg & Mark Bridges-Music.

HISTORIAN'S REQUEST

To honor this, our 190th year as Hammond Street Church, you have received "C.I." generated material on a weekly basis regarding all things historical in the form of "Did You Know..." articles appearing in the bulletin and newsletter and, at Easter, a booklet of highlights from the past 15 years (copies still available--just ask.) Now "C.I" wants to know what you want to know that could be one of the next "Did You Know..." celebration pieces AND also to thank you for your positive responses and some "gentle" words regarding a date error --so, for the record our parsonage at 30 High St was demolished in 1970 not 1960 as noted back in March. STEWARDSHIP TESTIMONY BY RACHEL HUTCHINS

Growing up as a pastor's kid, I don't have a specific memory of a start to the practice of stewardship in my life. The closest I can recall is a memory of my father opening his blue, squeezable, coin purse to give me a quarter for the offering on Sundays. He often gave me a winter green lifesaver at the same time. I'd honestly forgotten about this practice until I started helping Amelia gather her Sunday offerings. As a parent, I know now, the intention and habit necessary to not only add it to my list of parenting practices but to also instill the habit in another. When I participated, last year, with the youth ADELLA project, I was asked for a favorite bible verse. I want to share it here as well.

Isaiah 43 1-5a

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob,

he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.

2 When you pass through the waters, I will be with you;

and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you;

when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. **3** For I am the LORD your God,

the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. I give Egypt as your ransom, Ethiopia^a and Seba in exchange for you. 4 Because you are precious in my sight, and honored, and I love you,

I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. 5 Do not fear, for I am with you;

The reason this is a favorite is that it was marked, with a simple post-it note, in the Bible given to me by my child-hood pastor, upon my confirmation. She had chosen a unique verse for each youth in our class. Knowing the many duties and responsibilities of a pastor, this was a simple and small act of Stewardship and yet this Bible and post-it note have journeyed along with me for the last 25 years. Providing me a reminder of both the promises in the verse and the love behind Rev Donna's intention in choosing the verse to mark in my bible.

Here at Hammond Street, by acts small and large, we have great opportunities to invest in the ministry of this church; and we can do this through intentional acts of generosity. Whether it's the service of a community meal or collection of warm clothing, careful consideration of our financial resources and the ways our church building itself serves as ministry, the worship and mediation found through our experience with music, the ways we nurture a life of faith across all ages and all stages of life.
