WORDS OF HOPE

Advent is the Season in which we reminisce about the closing year and recall some of our favorite stories. This story doesn't come from me. It speaks for itself, and I don't need to add anything to it, but it deserves to be

shared here. Great theologians of life are all around us. One of my favorites has always been Katherine Hepburn. Please enjoy this story from her childhood, in the great actor's own words:

"Once when I was a teenager, my father and I were standing in line to buy tickets for the circus. Finally, there was only one other family between us and the ticket counter. This family made a big impression on me. There were eight children, all probably under the age of 12. The way they were dressed, you could tell they didn't have a lot of money, but their clothes were neat and clean.

"The children were well-behaved, all of them standing in line, two-by-two behind their parents, holding hands. They were excitedly jabbering about the clowns, animals, and all the acts they would be seeing that night. By their excitement you could sense they had never been to the circus before. It would be a highlight of their lives. The father and mother were at the head of the pack standing proud as could be. The mother was holding her husband's hand, looking up at him as if to say, 'You're my knight in shining armor.' He was smiling and enjoying seeing his family happy.

"The ticket lady asked the man how many tickets he wanted? He proudly responded, 'I'd like to buy eight children's tickets and two adult tickets, so I can take my family to the circus.' The ticket lady stated the price. The man's wife let go of his hand, her head dropped, the man's lip began to quiver. Then he leaned a little closer and asked, 'How much did you say?' The ticket lady again stated the price. The man didn't have enough money. How was he supposed to turn and tell his eight kids that he didn't have enough money to take them to the circus?

'Seeing what was going on, my dad reached into his pocket, pulled out a \$20 bill, and then dropped it on the ground. (We were not wealthy in any sense of the word!) My father bent down, picked up the \$20 bill, tapped the man on the shoulder and said, 'Excuse me, sir, this fell out of your pocket.' The man understood what was going on. He wasn't begging for a handout but certainly appreciated the help in a desperate, heartbreaking, and embarrassing situation. He looked straight into my dad's eyes, took my dad's hand in both of his, squeezed tightly onto the \$20 bill, and with his lip quivering and a tear streaming down his cheek, he replied; 'Thank you, thank you, sir. This really means a lot to me and my family.'"

"My father and I went back to our car and drove home. The \$20 that my dad gave away is what we were going to buy our own tickets with. Although we didn't get to see the circus that night, we both felt a joy inside us that was far greater than seeing the circus could ever provide.

That day I learned the value to Give. The Giver is bigger than the Receiver. If you want to be large, larger than life, learn to Give. Love has nothing to do with what you are expecting to get - only with what you are expecting to give - which is everything. The importance of giving, blessing others can never be over emphasized because there's always joy in sharing. Learn to make someone happy by acts of giving." ~ Katharine Hepburn

DID YOU KNOW

That the three Coe brothers, Eben Smith, Henry Willard (Sr.) and Thomas Upham, shared some things in common-- their kindness & desire to help others &, when it came to jobs, they all started out in one direction -- only to wind up embracing a new direction. Early in his life, Eben wanted to be a civil engineer, but work started on successive projects each failed because funding dried up, so his dad suggested he take a temporary position in the relatively new forest industry which became his passion & life's work. Thomas had wanted to be a physician since childhood & attained that goal yet, he practiced only 15 years before turning his full attention to business & financial interests. Not surprisingly some had to do with the timber industry & his positions with Merrill Trust, Penobscot Savings Bank, several railroads, Bangor Public Library & the Bangor Opera House. Brother Henry, although described as "...a leader among men..." in 1922, felt very lost at age 13 (1833) when his mother died & at 16 was encouraged to go West with a businessman who after 3 years offered him a partnership deal. Henry declined & returned home where he bought & ran his father's business & where one night his future changed when he observed a destitute widower being refused food & shelter at a local inn. He put the man up in his own home & tended to all of his needs for which the man kindly repaid him with information on a cotton mill in Cooperstown, NY he believed to be a profitable investment. This was the beginning of multiple business run & started by him over the decades. In California he is credited with the state's development as the first hops grower, silk producer, orchard grower, a miner, a shipper & an inn owner.² All three brothers had succeeded in life personally but, most importantly, making it better for others through philanthropy just as Father Ebenezer hoped. Our Pastor, Rev. Henry Griffin gave the 1900 Commemorative Address at the Northwood Academy in N.H. honoring the significant support & donations given by Eben S. Coe. Records on Henry & his namesake, Henry, Jr. show their contributions in the State of CA including the 87,000-acre Henry W. Coe State Park created in the Diablo Range. It was written of Thomas "...he may be classed as one of Maine's greatest philanthropists." We were blessed to have had such kind & generous individuals as Eben & Thomas in our midst from 1846-1920. We need volunteers to video tape the services on Sunday so that anyone can watch it on our Hammond Street Congregational Church Facebook page.


