FROM THE PASTOR'S OFFICE

WORDS OF HOPE

Today is the second day of the new year in the church. It is the Season of Christmastide. If you haven't heard enough of that old song, The Twelve Days of Christmas here is a portion of verse 2 "on the second day of Christmas my true love gave to me two turtledoves". Those doves are symbols of the union of the Old and New Testaments, the birth of the Messiah fulfilling the hope the Prophets talked about, the assurance of God's goodness to guide us through the good times and difficult times of uncertainty. Hope has been born.

If our prayer communication with God indicates a path for action for this new hope which seems unreal or unobtainable, then what must we do? Well, that was the question which Zechariah had to answer. You remember Zechariah? In the first chapter of Luke's Gospel, we read that he was a priest, both he and his wife were very old, and they had no children. While preparing to offer incense in the Jerusalem Temple, an angel from God appeared to him.

Zechariah was told that even in the couple's advanced age, they would have a baby boy who would serve God in a special way. He should be given the name, John, and he would be a forerunner to the true Messiah's arrival. This child would be filled with the Spirit of God and empowered like the prophet, Elijah. His preaching of repentance would result in many Jews turning from disobedience and toward obedience to the laws of God.

However, Zechariah's immediate response was doubt. How could he and Elizabeth have a successful pregnancy? They had tried for years and failed. His wife might laugh or ridicule him for trying against all odds. But the story is about hope being born through obedience to God. The gospel lesson implies that Zechariah went back home and had intercourse with Elizabeth. It didn't seem possible, but he obeyed the words of the angel.

Remember: Obedience to God is founded in our hope and action which are based in assurance of God's goodness and truth. Their baby, John, (the Baptizer) grew in the spirit and power of God and became the voice which welcomed Jesus into his redeeming ministry. Now it's our turn.

PRAYER

O God, on this Second Day of this New Year, we have the opportunity to continue Jesus' redeeming ministry. May we remember that the Advent Season began with Hope and now Hope has been born to us. Help us translate that hope into action. Amen

DID YOU KNOW

That our congregation, over the course of the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, has prepared food & feed thousands of faithful folks gathered under our roof in fellowship & fun—undoubtedly, by the women of the church. Occasions were varied: our Annual Meetings; honoring individuals; celebrating wedding anniversaries; doing receptions after weddings, ordinations & memorial services; dinners for any number of church groups; marking significant anniversaries of the church; dinners for countless Maine Conference & Association meetings we hosted, & dinners for ministers attending the annual BTS Convocation Week held at HSCC into the early 2000's. Then there were the dinners in the early 1900's after the annual holiday fairs -- now we serve lunch for fair goers; special "thank you" meals at the end of our Stewardship Campaigns; Installation dinners; meals during Lent & other holiday times, & the public "Bean Suppahs" which took on a new expanded life at our Folk Festival booth on the waterfront where we served the public with food prepared by a host of people working in our kitchen at all hours of the day & night. This information appears in our written records, scrapbooks filled with flyers & newspaper clippings & our newsletters; however, there is one special notebook on meals prepared & served started by Elva Warren (1903-1998) in 1950 & last in the possession of Roberta Seavey (1945-2023). These ladies had made all sorts of lists including the suppliers for & quantity & cost of ingredients needed for recipes feeding up to 260 for BTS Convocations; lists of other materials need & assignments of people starting with purchases through clean-up plus diagrams of table arrangements in the large vestry. In addition, they kept track of the dinners served; Roberta's last entry was in 2015. Elva notes that 1961 is "the first year in the new kitchen..." which was a major renovation of the 1890 facility --enlarged & new cabinets & closet. Over many decades, the women of the church have bought new stoves (no more wood fires), refrigerators & freezers. Over the years, the men of the church have shown off their "chef" skills with baked beans, chili & chowders, & other special meals & through our Christian Outreach Committee, we prepare & take to the Bangor Area Homeless Shelter a monthly meal for the clients. The Committee also, with the help of many at home, prepares & serves a free hot meal the first Saturday of every month & a bag lunch to go. We truly are walking in the shoes of the Master as we continue to find new ways to "feed the thousands."
