Social Justice at HSCC

HSCC has a long history of supporting social justice. The HSCC Executive Committee is made up of chairs or representatives of our major committees and meets quarterly or more if needed. The Committee is responsible for strategic planning and ensuring that all activities of HSCC are coordinated. At our March 18, 2025 meeting, a focus emerged around Social Justice at HSCC with the decision that we would identify one topic a month which HSCC has historically supported and provide current information to our congregation. For those who wish to make their voices heard on one or more of these topics there are many avenues. We will provide resources to all at our church and through the Hammond Streeter.

At our service on Sunday, March 23, 2025, the topic of food security was highlighted. As you know HSCC has long hosted the Ecumenical Food Pantry as well as providing meals for the Homeless Shelter, hosting our Free Bean Lunches and the Thanksgiving meal, and assisting with the Letter Carriers' Food Drive.

March 23, 2025, Social Justice Information:

This information affects many but in particular Food Pantries and Public Schools across the country.

On March 12, 2025, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) cancelled the program that helps food banks and schools source nutritious food from local producers.

Also, on that same day, a long-standing federal program that provides staple food products (such as rice, flour, oats, canned vegetables, canned beans, etc.) to food banks and schools announced that they will reduce monthly allocations by 50% to 65%.

March 21, 2025, a Director at the Good Shepard Food Bank confirmed that those decisions remain in effect.
